STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Commissioners approve the General Manager to sign the Settlement Agreement and Stipulation for Entry of Order in the amount of \$129,000 to the California Regional Water Quality Control, pending legal review and approval of the agreement.

PREVIOUS ACTION(S)

None

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On January 16, 2020, the VVWRA was notified by the Lahontan Regional Water Quality Board of a Notice of Violation (NOV) for assessing Mandatory Minimum Penalties (MMP). The original MMP amount was \$144,000. After Receiving a 30-day extension to respond due to the number and age of the violations which covered violations from August 1, 2008 to November 30, 2019, the VVWRA staff drafted a retort to the NOV on March 18, 2020. In the March 18 response VVWRA staff agreed to some of the violations and disputed a number of other points of concern.

On April 2, 2020 VVWRA staff received a revised NOV lowering the MMP to \$129,000. An April 23, 2020 VVWRA staff responded to the Revised NOV informing the Lahontan Water Board that the Authority would prefer to proceed with no further argument regarding the validity of the NOV and that the authority was amenable to the \$129,000 MMP. The VVRWA at this time asked if the Lahontan Water Board would be amenable to the utilization of a Supplemental Environmental Plan as an opportunity to divert penalty dollars to a local beneficial project. A

SEP involving the City of Victorville's Septic to Sewer System Project in Old Town Victorville was selected and approved as the SEP of choice.

On June 25, 2020, the Lahontan Regional Water Quality Board revised the NOV to add additional MMP moving the new total to \$135,000. On July 30, 2020, The VVWRA staff responded to these new violations and provided information to dispute the validity of the concerns. In August of 2020, the Lahontan team rescinded the revised NOV based on the VVWRA response and allowed the previous MMP amount of \$129,000 to stand.

Since that time the VVWRA staff and the Lahontan Regional Water Quality Board have been in discussions on the amount of funds that could be used for the SEP and a final agreement to resolve this matter. The Lahontan Regional Water Quality Board and the VVWRA legal team have reviewed and agreed upon a settlement agreement attached as Exhibit 1.

At this time, the VVWRA staff recommends to the Board of Commissioners that they allow the General Manager to sign Order No. R6V-2021-0004 VVWRA Settlement Agreement and Stipulation for Entry of Order.

Order No. R6V-2021-0004 Victor Valley Wastewater Reclamation Authority Settlement Agreement and Stipulation for Entry of Order

Section I: INTRODUCTION

This Settlement Agreement and Stipulation for Entry of Administrative Civil Liability Order (Settlement Agreement and Stipulation for Order) is entered into by and between the California Regional Water Quality Control Board, Lahontan Region Prosecution Team (Prosecution Team) and Victor Valley Wastewater Reclamation Authority (VVWRA) (collectively, "Parties"), and is presented to the California Regional Water Quality Control Board, Lahontan Region (Lahontan Water Board), for adoption as an Order, by settlement, pursuant to Government Code section 11415.60.

Section II: RECITALS

- VVWRA is a California Joint Powers Authority (JPA) that owns, operates, and maintains wastewater collection, treatment, and disposal facilities. Member agencies of the JPA are the City of Victorville, City of Hesperia, Town of Apple Valley, and two San Bernardino County service areas (Oro Grande and Spring Valley Lakes). VVWRA serves approximately 284,280 people within the northern portion of San Bernardino County.
- 2. VVWRA's wastewater treatment facility provides tertiary treatment of domestic and commercial wastewater. An annual average of up to 14 million gallons per day (mgd) may be discharged to the Mojave River and up to 22 mgd may be used as reclaimed water. Wastewater may also be discharged to percolation ponds.
- 3. On February 14, 2008, the Lahontan Water Board adopted Waste Discharge Requirements (WDR) Order No. R6V-2008-004 (NPDES No. CA0102822) which included effluent limitations and other requirements regarding VVWRA's discharge. On July 17, 2013, the Lahontan Water Board adopted WDR Order No. R6V-2013-0038, which contained updated requirements and rescinded the 2008 WDR Order, except for purposes of enforcement. On May 6, 2020, the Lahontan Water Board adopted WDR Order No. R6V-2020-0029, which contains updated requirements and rescinds the 2013 WDR Order, except for purposes of enforcement.
- 4. On February 14, 2008, the Lahontan Water Board issued Cease and Desist Order (CDO) No. R6V-2008-005 to VVWRA. Among other items, the CDO includes interim effluent limitations for ammonia and nitrate, which extend through January 31, 2013.

- On June 16, 2010, the Lahontan Water Board issued Time Schedule Order (TSO)
 No. R6V-2010-0027 to VVWRA. Among other items, the TSO includes interim
 effluent limitations for total cyanide, chlorodibromomethane, and
 dichlorobromomethane, which extend through January 31, 2013.
- 6. On May 29, 2014, the Lahontan Water Board issued TSO No. R6V-2014-0039 to VVWRA. Among other items, the TSO includes interim effluent limitations for ammonia and total nitrogen, which extend through June 30, 2015.
- 7. On December 19, 2014, the Executive Officer of the Lahontan Water Board amended TSO No. R6V-2014-0039 through issuance of TSO No. R6V-2014-0039-A1. The amended TSO extended the interim effluent limitations for ammonia and total nitrogen to March 31, 2016.
- 8. On November 13, 2008, the Lahontan Water Board adopted Administrative Civil Liability Order (ACLO) No. R6V-2008-0036 for VVWRA. The ACLO imposed \$324,000 in Mandatory Minimum Penalties (MMPs) for effluent limitation violations that occurred between August 30, 2005 and July 31, 2008. The ACLO required payment of \$170,380 to the State Water Resources Control Board Cleanup and Abatement Account and allowed \$153,620 to be permanently suspended upon VVWRA's completion of a Supplemental Environmental Project (SEP) titled "Mojave River Characterization Study." VVWRA paid the penalty and satisfactorily completed the SEP.
- 9. On January 15, 2020, the Prosecution Team issued a Notice of Violation (NOV) to VVWRA. The NOV described alleged effluent limitation violations which occurred between August 1, 2008 and November 30, 2019. On March 18, 2020, VVWRA provided documentation showing that five of the alleged violations were in error. The Prosecution Team agreed and removed those five violations, decreasing the mandatory minimum penalty amount to \$129,000.
- 10. While preparing draft settlement documents, the Prosecution Team reviewed VVWRA's monitoring reports for the period of December 1, 2019 through April 30, 2020. The Prosecution Team issued an updated NOV on June 25, 2020, alleging an additional six effluent violations and increasing the mandatory minimum penalty to \$135,000. VVWRA responded on July 7, 2020, providing information to show that the two chlorine violations were due to sampling error. The Prosecution Team agreed with VVWRA's assessment, and on July 14, 2020, issued a revised NOV that removed the two chlorine violations and decreased the mandatory minimum penalty amount to \$129,0000. The Prosecution Team has since reviewed VVWRA's most recent monitoring reports and has extended the period of review to September 30, 2020. There are no additional effluent limitation violations.
- 11. VVWRA is subject to \$129,000 in mandatory minimum penalties for effluent limitation violations that took place between August 1, 2008 and September 30, 2020.

12. California Water Code (Water Code) section 13385, subdivisions (h) and (i) require assessment of mandatory penalties as follows:

Water Code section 13385, subdivision (h)(1) states:

Notwithstanding any other provision of this division, and except as provided in subdivisions (j), (k), and (l), a mandatory minimum penalty of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) shall be assessed for each serious violation.

Water Code section 13385, subdivision (h)(2) states:

For the purposes of this section, a "serious violation" means any waste discharge that violates the effluent limitation contained in the applicable waste discharge requirements for a Group II pollutant, as specified in Appendix A to Section 123.45 of Title 40 of the Code of Federal Regulations, by 20 percent or more or for a Group I pollutant, as specified in Appendix A to Section 123.45 of Title 40 of the Code of Federal Regulations, by 40 percent or more.

Water Code section 13385, subdivision (i)(1) states, in part:

Notwithstanding any other provision of this division, and except as provided in subdivisions (j), (k), and (l), a mandatory minimum penalty of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) shall be assessed for each violation whenever the person does any of the following four or more times in any period of six consecutive months, except that the requirement to assess the mandatory minimum penalty shall not be applicable to the first three violations:

- (A) Violates a waste discharge requirement effluent limitation.
- (B) Fails to file a report pursuant to Section 13260.
- (C) Files an incomplete report pursuant to Section 13260.
- (D) Violates a toxicity effluent limitation contained in the applicable waste discharge requirements where the waste discharge requirements do not contain pollutant-specific effluent limitations for toxic pollutants.
- 13. Water Code section 13385.1 (a)(1) requires the assessment of mandatory penalties for certain failures to submit monitoring reports, and states:

For the purposes of subdivision (h) of section 13385, a 'serious violation' also means a failure to file a discharge monitoring report required pursuant to section 13383 for each complete period of 30 days following the deadline for submitting the report, if the report is designed to ensure compliance with limitations contained in waste discharge requirements that contain effluent limitations.

- 14. Water Code section 13385 subdivision (j)(3) states that mandatory penalties do not apply when effluent limitation violations are in compliance with a cease and desist order or a time schedule order, and states in part:
 - Subdivisions (h) and (i) do not apply to any of the following:...(3) A violation of an effluent limitation where the waste discharge is in compliance with either a cease and desist order issued pursuant to Section 13301 or a time schedule order issued pursuant to Section 13300 or 13308, if all of the following requirements are met:
 - (A) The cease and desist order or time schedule order is issued on or after July 1, 2000, and specifies the actions that the discharger is required to take in order to correct the violations that would otherwise be subject to subdivisions (h) and (i).
- 15. WDR Order No. R6V-2008-004, Effluent Limitations and Discharge Specifications IV.A.1.a. includes, in part, the following: "The Discharger shall maintain compliance with the following effluent limitations at Discharge Point 001..."

- 16. WDR Order No. R6V-2008-004, Effluent Limitations and Discharge Specifications IV.A.1.e states "Total Coliform: Effluent shall at all times be adequately disinfected, oxidized, coagulated, clarified, filtered wastewater. The number of total coliform bacteria shall not exceed any of the following:
 - A median Most Probable Number (MPN) of 2.2 per 100 mL based on the results of the last seven days for which analyses have been completed
 - An MPN of 23 per 100 mL in more than one sample in any 30-day period
 - An MPN of 240 per 100 mL at any time (instantaneous maximum)."
- 17. WDR Order No. R6V-2008-004, Effluent Limitations and Discharge Specifications IV.A.1.f states "**Turbidity**: Effluent shall be a filtered wastewater that does not exceed any of the following:
 - An average of 2 NTU within a 24-hour period
 - 5 NTU more than 5 percent of the time in a 24-hour period
 - 10 NTU at any time (instantaneous maximum)."
- 18. WDR Order No. R6V-2013-0038, Effluent Limitations and Discharge Specifications IV.A.1.a includes, in part, the following: "The Discharger shall maintain compliance with the following effluent limitations at Discharge Point 001..."

- 19. WDR Order No. R6V-2013-0038, Effluent Limitations and Discharge Specifications IV.A.1.c states: "Dissolved Oxygen. Effluent concentrations of dissolved oxygen shall, at a minimum, contain:
 - i. 4.0 mg/L as a daily minimum;
 - ii. 5.0 mg/L as an average calendar weekly minimum; and
 - iii. 6.5 mg/L as an average calendar monthly average."

- 20. WDR Order No. R6V-2013-0038, Effluent Limitations and Discharge Specifications IV.A.1.e states "Total Coliform Organisms: Effluent at all times shall be adequately disinfected, oxidized, coagulated, clarified, and filtered. The number of total coliform bacteria shall not exceed any of the following:
 - i. A median most probable number (MPN) of 2.2 per 100 mL based on the results of the last seven days for which analyses have been completed;
 - ii. 23 MPN/100 mL in more than one sample in any 30-day period; and,
 - iii. 240 MPN/100 mL at any time (instantaneous maximum)."
- 21. According to VVWRA's self-monitoring reports, VVWRA committed three (3) serious violations of Group I constituents contained in WDR Orders No. R6V-2008-004 and No. R6V-2013-0038 between August 1, 2008 and September 30, 2020. The violations are defined as serious because measured concentrations of Group I constituents exceeded maximum prescribed levels by more than 40 percent. The mandatory minimum penalty for these three serious violations is nine thousand dollars (\$9,000).
- 22. According to VVWRA's self-monitoring reports, VVWRA committed sixteen (16) serious violations of Group II constituents contained in WDR Orders No. R6V-2008-004 and No. R6V-2013-0038 between August 1, 2008 and September 30, 2020. The violations are defined as serious because measured concentrations of Group II constituents exceeded maximum prescribed levels by more than 20 percent. The mandatory minimum penalty for these 16 serious violations is forty-eight thousand dollars (\$48,000).
- 23. According to VVWRA's self-monitoring reports, the District committed thirty-eight (38) non-serious (chronic) violations of the effluent limitations contained in WDR Orders No. R6V-2008-004 and No. R6V-2013-0038 between August 1, 2008 and September 30, 2020. Twenty (20) violations are subject to mandatory minimum penalties because these violations were preceded by three or more similar violations within a six-month period. The mandatory minimum penalty for these 20 non-serious (chronic) violations is sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000).
- 24. VVWRA submitted three late self-monitoring reports between August 1, 2008 and September 30, 2020. Because these reports were designed to ensure compliance with the effluent limitations in WDR Orders No. R6V-2008-004 and No. R6V-2013-0038, each complete period of 30-days following the submittal deadline is a serious violation subject to mandatory minimum penalties. There were four (4) 30-day periods following the submittal deadlines; therefore, the mandatory penalty for these late reports is twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000).
- 25. The total amount of mandatory minimum penalties assessed for the cited effluent limitation violations is **one hundred twenty-nine thousand dollars (\$129,000)**. A detailed list of the effluent limitation violations is included in Attachment A, a part of

- this Order. This Order addresses administrative civil liability for violations that are specifically listed in Attachment A as subject to mandatory minimum penalties.
- 26. On August 13, 2020, VVWRA requested that the entire \$129,000 penalty be suspended upon completion of a Supplemental Environmental Project (SEP). The proposed SEP would augment the City of Victorville's current SEP which is described and authorized by Settlement Agreement Order No. R6V-2020-0001 (https://www.waterboards.ca.gov/lahontan/board_decisions/adopted_orders/2020/r6_v_2020_0001_city_of_vvl_sep.pdf). The City of Victorville's SEP establishes a grant program to assist residents and commercial property owners to connect to the City sewer system and properly abandon their septic systems. VVWRA's proposed SEP would waive the fees needed to connect residents and commercial property owners to the City of Victorville's sewer system.
- 27. Water Code section 13385(I) allows a discharger to complete a SEP in lieu of paying the full amount of a mandatory minimum penalty, as quoted in relevant part below. For this matter, up to \$72,000 may be applied toward a SEP.
 - (I)(1) In lieu of assessing penalties pursuant to subdivision (h) or (i), the state board or the regional board, with concurrence of the discharger, may direct a portion of the penalty amount to be expended on a supplemental environmental project in accordance with the enforcement policy of the state board. If the penalty amount exceeds fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), the portion of the penalty amount that may be directed to be expended on a supplemental environmental project may not exceed fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) plus 50 percent of the penalty amount that exceeds fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000).
 - (2) For the purposes of this section, a "supplemental environmental project" means an environmentally beneficial project that a person agrees to undertake, with the approval of the regional board, that would not be undertaken in the absence of an enforcement action under this section.

Section III: STIPULATIONS

The Parties stipulate to the following:

- 28. Administrative Civil Liability: VVWRA hereby agrees to the imposition of an administrative civil liability totaling one hundred twenty-nine thousand dollars (\$129,000). Further, VVWRA agrees that seventy-two thousand dollars (\$72,000) of the penalty shall be suspended pending completion of a SEP as set forth in Paragraph 26 of Section II and Paragraph 31 of Section III of this document.
- 29. **Payment**: VVWRA will make a payment of \$57,000 made payable to the "State Water Resources Control Board Cleanup and Abatement Account" **within 30 days**

of the Lahontan Water Board or Executive Officer issuing this Settlement Agreement and Stipulation for Entry of Order (Order). The check or money order shall reference Administrative Civil Liability Order No. R6V-2021-0004 and be submitted to:

VVWRA shall email a copy of the check to <u>Lahontan@waterboards.ca.gov</u> with the subject line "VVWRA MMP Payment."

31. **Description of SEP**: VVWRA will waive up to \$72,000 in VVWRA connection fees associated with the SEP currently underway by the City of Victorville as part of Settlement Agreement Order No. R6V-2020-0001. The City of Victorville has established a grant program to assist residents and commercial property owners in connecting into the City sewer system and properly abandoning their septic systems in the Old Town area of the City. Under its SEP, the City will also manage construction activities necessary to connect such properties to the City sewer system. Many of the septic systems in the Old Town area of the City are in close proximity to the Mojave River and/or have high groundwater conditions. Such conditions often result in adverse impacts to groundwater quality and cause potential threats to public health. The connection fees and construction costs to connect to the City's sewer system have proven cost-prohibitive for several property owners in the project area, identified as disadvantaged by the California Environmental Protection Agency's CalEnviroScreen System. The sewer connection grant program will assist such property owners, allowing them to connect to the City sewer system and cease discharging domestic wastewater to onsite wastewater treatment systems. Priority projects for this program will include an area in Old Town where properties are adjacent to an existing sewer main and usually only require a lateral connection to connect to the sewer system. Additional criteria elevating a property's priority for connection include those in close proximity to known contaminants (e.g., petroleum hydrocarbons, chlorinated hydrocarbons) and properties with a failing septic system that must connect to the sewer system in accordance with the City's codes.

The City's SEP includes payment of all costs associated with abandoning a septic system and connecting to the City sewer system, estimated to be \$26,000 per property owner. This includes payment of the VVWRA connection fee of approximately \$4,000 per connection. Because VVWRA's SEP waives the connection fees, the City's cost will be reduced by about \$4,000 per property owner, thus allowing the City to provide grants to an additional 3-5 properties to abandon their septic systems and connect to the City sewer system.

- 32. **SEP Requirements:** VVWRA's augmentation of the City of Victorville's SEP meets the characteristics of an acceptable SEP as specified in Water Code section 13385(I)(2) as follows:
 - a. Environmentally beneficial project: VVWRA's SEP will improve groundwater quality by providing a monetary contribution toward eliminating septic tank waste discharges and associated pollutants to the groundwater from the properties connecting to the City of Victorville's sewer system. Doing so will reduce the risks to public health and the environment by reducing high nutrient and bacteria levels caused by septic tank waste discharges in areas of high groundwater and in close proximity to surface waters.
 - b. "Voluntarily" agrees to undertake: The SEP is not otherwise required of VVWRA by any rule or regulation of any federal, state, or local entity.
 - c. In settlement of an enforcement action: VVWRA's commitment to implement the SEP is included in this Order, a legally enforceable settlement document. Although the City of Victorville's project has begun, VVWRA's waiving of the connection fees has not commenced and will not commence prior to the adoption of this Order.
- 33. **SEP Completion Date**: The SEP shall be completed in its entirety no later than November 29, 2021 ("SEP Completion Date"). If other circumstances beyond the control of VVWRA prevent completion of the SEP by that date, the Executive Officer may extend the SEP Completion Date in writing. VVWRA must send its request for an extension in writing with the necessary justification to the Executive Officer a minimum of 30 days prior to the SEP Completion Date.
- 34. Representations of VVWRA: As a material consideration for the Lahontan Water Board's acceptance of this Order, VVWRA represents that it will utilize the funds outlined in Paragraph 31 in cooperation with the City of Victorville. VVWRA understands that its promise to implement the SEP, in its entirety and in accordance with the schedule for implementation, is a material condition of this settlement of liability between VVWRA and the Lahontan Water Board. VVWRA represents that it will spend the SEP amount as described in this Order, and that within 30 days of the completing the SEP, it will provide written certification, under penalty of perjury, that VVWRA followed all applicable environmental laws and regulations in implementing the SEP including the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) (14 CCR § 15000 et seq.) and the federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. § 1251 et seq.).
- 35. **Publicity**: Whenever VVWRA or its agents or subcontractors publicizes one or more elements of the SEP, it shall state in a <u>prominent manner</u> that the project is being undertaken as part of the settlement of an enforcement action by the Lahontan Water Board against VVWRA.

36. Progress Reports: VVWRA shall provide quarterly progress reports as follows:

Monitoring Period	Report Due Date

October 1 – December 31	February 1

The first quarterly progress report is due May 1, 2021. The progress reports shall at a minimum, provide the following information:

- a. A description of SEP activities conducted during the Monitoring Period;
- b. An accounting of SEP expenditures for the Monitoring Period; and
- c. A description of SEP activities planned for the next Monitoring Period.
- 37. Final SEP Report and Certification of Expenditures: Within 30 days of completing the SEP, VVWRA shall submit a Final SEP Report identifying all completed SEP-related work and providing a certified statement by a responsible official documenting VVWRA's expenditures in implementing the SEP. In making such certification, the official may rely upon normal project tracking systems that capture employee time expenditures and external payments to outside vendors or contractors. VVWRA shall provide any additional information requested by the Executive Officer that is reasonably necessary to verify SEP-related completed work and VVWRA's expenditures.
- 38. Third Party Audit: Upon completing the SEP, or failure to complete the SEP, and at the discretion of the Executive Officer, VVWRA, at its sole cost, shall submit a report prepared by an independent third party acceptable to the Executive Officer providing such third party's professional opinion that VVWRA has expended money in the amounts claimed. Such information shall be provided to the Executive Officer within three months of the Executive Officer's request for the third-party audit.
- 39. Lahontan Water Board Acceptance of Completed SEP: Upon VVWRA's satisfaction of its obligations under this Settlement Agreement and Stipulation for Order, the completion of the SEP, and any audits, the Executive Officer shall issue a "Satisfaction of Order." The issuance of the Satisfaction of Order shall terminate any of VVWRA's further obligations under this Settlement Agreement and Stipulation for Order.
- 40. Failure to Expend All Suspended Administrative Civil Liability Funds on the Completed SEP: In the event that VVWRA is not able to explain to the reasonable satisfaction of the Executive Officer that it has spent the entire SEP amount on the completed SEP, VVWRA shall pay the difference between the suspended \$72,000 and the amount that VVWRA can reasonably demonstrate was actually spent on

the SEP as an administrative civil liability. Such payment shall be made to the State Water Resources Control Board Cleanup and Abatement Account after service of the Executive Officer's determination.

- 41. Failure to Complete the SEP: If the SEP is not fully implemented within the SEP time schedule required by this Order, or there has been a material failure to satisfy a milestone requirement, VWRA shall be liable to pay the entire suspended amount of \$72,000, or some portion thereof less the value of the completion of any milestone requirement (e.g., a parcel's connection fee). Unless otherwise ordered, VVRWA shall not be entitled to any credit, offset, or reimbursement from the Lahontan Water Board for expenditures made on the SEP prior to the failure to complete the SEP. Upon a determination by the Executive Officer that an amount of the suspended liability is due, the amount owed shall be paid to the State Water Resources Control Board Cleanup and Abatement Account after service of the Executive Officer's determination. Payment of the assessed amount shall satisfy the City's obligations to implement the SEP in its entirety.
- 42. Lahontan Water Board is Not Liable: Neither the Lahontan Water Board members nor the Lahontan Water Board staff, attorneys, or representatives shall be liable for any injury or damage to persons or property resulting from acts or omissions by VVWRA, its directors, officers, employees, agents, representatives or contractors in carrying out activities pursuant to this Order, nor shall the Lahontan Water Board, its members or staff be held as parties to or guarantors of any contract entered into by VVWRA, its directors, officers, employees, agents, representatives or contractors in carrying out activities pursuant to this Order. VVWRA covenants not to sue or pursue any administrative or civil claim or claims against any State Agency or the State of California, or their officers, employees, representatives, agents, or attorneys arising out of or relating to any matter expressly addressed by this Order.
- 43. Compliance with Applicable Laws: VVWRA understands that payment of administrative civil liability in accordance with the terms of this Order or compliance with its terms is not a substitute for compliance with applicable laws, and that continuing violations of the type alleged herein may subject VVWRA to further enforcement, including additional administrative civil liability.
- 44. Attorney's Fees and Costs: Except as otherwise provided herein, each Party shall bear all attorneys' fees and costs arising from the Party's own counsel in connection with the matters set forth herein.
- 45. **Matters Addressed by Stipulation**: Upon adoption by the Lahontan Water Board or the Executive Officer issuing the proposed Order as final, this Order represents a final and binding resolution and settlement of all claims, violations or causes of action alleged herein. The provisions of this Paragraph are expressly conditioned on the full payment of the administrative civil liability by the deadline specified in

Section III, Paragraph 29 and VVWRA's full satisfaction of the obligations described in Section III, Paragraphs 31, 33, and 36.

- 46. **Public Notice**: VVWRA understands that this Order will be noticed for a 30-day public comment period prior to consideration by the Lahontan Water Board or the Executive Officer. If significant new information is received that reasonably affects the propriety of presenting this Order to the Lahontan Water Board for adoption, the Prosecution Team Lead may unilaterally declare it void and decide not to present it to the Lahontan Water Board. VVWRA agrees that it may not rescind or otherwise withdraw its approval of this Order.
- 47. Addressing Objections Raised During Public Comment Period: The Parties agree that the procedure contemplated for adopting this Order by the Lahontan Water Board or the Executive Officer and its review by the public is lawful and adequate. In the event procedural objections are raised prior to the Order becoming effective, the Parties agree to meet and confer concerning any such objections and may agree to revise or adjust the procedure as necessary or advisable under the circumstances.
- 48. **Interpretation:** This Order shall be construed as if the Parties prepared it jointly. Any uncertainty or ambiguity shall not be interpreted against any one Party. VVWRA is represented by counsel in this matter.
- 49. **Modification**: This Order shall not be modified by any of the Parties by oral representation made before or after its execution. All modifications must be in writing, signed by all Parties and approved by the Lahontan Water Board or the Executive Officer. All approvals and decisions of the Lahontan Water Board and the Executive Officer under the terms of this Order shall be communicated to VVWRA in writing. No oral advice, guidance, suggestions or comments by employees or officials of the Lahontan Water Board regarding submissions or notices shall be construed to relieve VVWRA of its obligation to obtain any final written approval required by this Order.
- 50. If the Order Does Not Take Effect: In the event that this Order does not take effect because it is not approved by the Lahontan Water Board or Executive Officer, or is vacated in whole or in part by the State Water Board or a court, the Parties acknowledge that they expect to proceed to a contested evidentiary hearing before the Lahontan Water Board to determine whether to assess administrative civil liabilities for the underlying alleged violations, unless the Parties agree otherwise. The Parties agree that all oral and written statements and agreements made during the course of settlement discussions will not be admissible as evidence in the hearing. The Parties agree to waive any and all objections based on settlement communications in this matter, including but not limited to:
 - a. Objections related to prejudice or bias of any of the Lahontan Water Board members or their advisors and any other objections that are premised in whole

or in part on the fact that the Lahontan Water Board members or their advisors were exposed to some of the material facts and the Parties' settlement positions as a consequence of reviewing the Order, and therefore may have formed impressions or conclusions prior to any contested evidentiary hearing in this matter; or

- b. Laches or delay or other equitable defenses based on the time period for administrative or judicial review to the extent this period has been extended by these settlement proceedings.
- 51. **Waiver of Hearing:** VVWRA has been informed of the rights provided by California Water Code section 13323, subdivision (b), and hereby waives its right to a hearing before the Lahontan Water Board prior to the adoption of the Order.
- 52. Waiver of Right to Petition or Appeal: VVWRA hereby waives its right to petition the Lahontan Water Board's adoption of the Order for review by the State Water Board, and further waives its rights, if any, to appeal the same to a California Superior Court and/or any California appellate level court. This explicit waiver of rights includes potential future decisions by the Lahontan Water Board, or its delegate related to this Order, including but not limited to time extensions and other terms contained in this Order.
- 53. Covenant Not to Sue: VVWRA covenants not to sue or pursue any administrative or civil claim(s) against any state agency or the State of California, their officers, Board Members, employees, representatives, agents, or attorneys arising out of or relating to any matter covered herein.
- 54. Authority to Bind: Each person executing this Order in a representative capacity represents and warrants that he or she is authorized to execute it on behalf of and to bind the entity on whose behalf he or she executes it.
- 55. **Effective Date:** The obligations in this Order are effective and binding only upon the entry of an Order by the Lahontan Water Board or Executive Officer which incorporates the terms of this Order.
- 56. **Severability:** This Stipulation and Order are severable; should any provision be found invalid the remainder shall remain in full force and effect.
- 57. Counterpart Signatures: This Order may be executed and delivered in any number of counterparts, each of which when executed and delivered shall be deemed to be an original, but such counterparts shall together constitute one document.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Commissioners approve an increase in the billable hour rate for BBK senior partners in the special counsel areas from \$346 to \$360. This will allow VVWRA to avail itself of the more senior partners at the firm who have a high level of experience in their field, some of whom have been performing special counsel work for VVWRA for 10 years and more. There are no changes to the retainer agreement and rates of other attorneys at BBK, including Piero Dallarda's rates for general counsel work or the rates of more junior partners, associates, or paralegals. This change is limited to the special counsel rates of senior partners.

PREVIOUS ACTION(S)

The base special counsel rates for BBK senior partners ([partners with more than 10 years of experience) have not been increased since 2010. BBK has indicated that, to the extent that staff prefers working with senior partners at the firm in special counsel matters, an increase of 4% for those rates is necessary. This increase only applies to the rates for senior partners and only applies to special counsel matters. This increase also does not affect our retainer and it does not affect our general counsel rates under the retainer. The VVWRA general counsel work which is performed by Piero Dallarda under the retainer agreement is not affected by this increase. Those rates remain the same and the retainer remains unchanged. The increase of 4% only affects the senior partners special counsel rates if we choose to work with them on special counsel matters such as labor and employment matters, public contracting and CEQA. The remaining rates for junior partners, associates and paralegals remain the same.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

We have a legal services contract with Best Best &Krieger LLP to provide general counsel services and special counsel services. The general counsel services are provided primarily by Piero Dallarda and are subject to a CPI increase. Other than the CPI increase, the retainer for general counsel services has not been increased since 2010. VVWRA also uses BBK for special counsel services in the areas of labor and employment, public contracting, litigation and environmental matters among others. VVWRA's uses those services on an "as needed basis" and always has the option to use other firms if we so choose. For certain matters, for instance where there may be a conflict, VVWRA has used firms other than BBK at rates between \$400-\$450. The base rates for BBK senior partners in the special counsel areas have not been increased since 2010 and currently stands at approximately \$345 for senior partners. BBK has indicated that it will be increasing the senior partner special counsel rates to by approximately 4% to \$360 per hour. There is no increase for the rates of junior partners, of counsel, associates or paralegals. Those rates remain the same. There is also no increase in the retainer or general counsel services provided by Piero Dallarda. Those rates are subject to agreement and CPI increases and are not affected by this increase. Staff recommends that the Board of Commissioners approve the proposed increase limited to the special counsel rates of senior partners so that staff can have the choice to use senior partners when necessary for the special counsel work given their greater level of experience, which usually turns into faster turnaround and quick responses.

FISCAL IMPACT

It is hard to measure the overall fiscal impact because it depends on how much we choose to use BBK senior partners in the special counsel areas and the matters involve. The increase for the special counsel billable hour rate for the senior partners would be from \$345 to \$360.

It is recommended that the Board of Commissioners approve the General Manager and the Controller to amend the FY 2020-21 Operating Budget with one-time Revenues totaling \$440,000 to fund unforeseen operating needs which include the staff recommended purchases and services detailed in (Exhibit 1).

It is recommended that the Board of Commissioners approve the General Manager and the Controller to utilize unrestricted Capital Connection Fees to cover the SRF loan payment shortcoming of \$1,193,922.

PREVIOUS ACTION(S)

June 18, 2020 the VVWRA Board of Commissioners approved the FY 2020-21 Budget.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On October 30, 2020, the VVWRA received the first annual settlement payment from the City of Victorville totaling \$440,000. This unforeseen revenue was not recognized in the approved FY2020-21 Operating Budget. The current Mid-Year budget review reflects a balanced budget to date and expected revenues and expenses are on track to meet fiscal year budgeted needs. Due to unforeseen operating needs the Staff is recommending that the Board approve the usage of these one-time revenues for the purchase of equipment and services detailed in (Exhibit 1).

During the mid-year budget review staff identified a significant shortcoming in the amount of connection fee revenues that the Agency has projected to receive. Some of this shortcoming can be attributed to the withholding of connection fees by the City of Hesperia and another contributing factor could be to the COVID pandemic limiting development fees to the member agencies. At this time the current balance of connection fees and projected to receive are not sufficient to cover the pending SRF loan payment of \$2,133,072. Staff is requesting the Board to approve the General Manager and the Controller to utilize unrestricted Capital Connection Fees to cover the SRF loan payment shortcoming of \$1,193,922. The Contractor will furnish all labor, equipment, materials, and supervision to perform landscape maintenance, including but not limited to, weeding and cultivating, maintaining the irrigation system, watering, trimming pruning, mulching, litter, removal, brush clearance, treatment, control of plant diseases, applying herbicides, chemical weed control, clean-up, and debris removal and hardscape maintenance.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Commissioners approve the General Manager to award the purchase of a spiral heat exchanger and hot water pump from Saddleback Environmental in the amount of \$68, 715.

PREVIOUS ACTION(S)

On June 18, 2020, the Board of Commissioners approved year 2020-2021 fiscal budget. The funds for this request reside in GL Code 01-02-535-9000-R-143 CIP Budget.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Operations and Maintenance staff rehabilitated DAFT #3 and placed the unit in service to thicken primary sludge before digestion. This has yielded large gains in digester detention time, drying bed capacity, from lowering the total amount of digestate, and wear and tear on equipment that would be cycling more often to pump thinner material. Unfortunately, this float being exposed to the elements is susceptible to freezing, rendering it unpumpable. The heat exchanger and corresponding pump will transfer heat from the existing hot water loop to heat the thickened primary sludge created in DAFT #3. This will keep the sludge from freezing and will lower the energy needed to heat the digesters by pre-heating the sludge.

Requests for bids were sent out to several preferred vendors. We received quotes from only two companies, due to this item being specialized made to order equipment. Because the minimum of three quotes were not obtained. The VVWRA purchasing policy section VII part H. Exclusions grants the board authority to deviate from the policy and award the purchase of this equipment to Saddleback Environmental. Details on the bid process and the determination to award this bid can be found in Exhibit 1 of this report. The low bid was not considered viable due the delivery time of the equipment was over 6 months out.

At this time staff is seeking approval from the Board to approve \$68,715.00 to Saddleback Environmental for the purchase of a spiral heat exchanger and hot water pump.

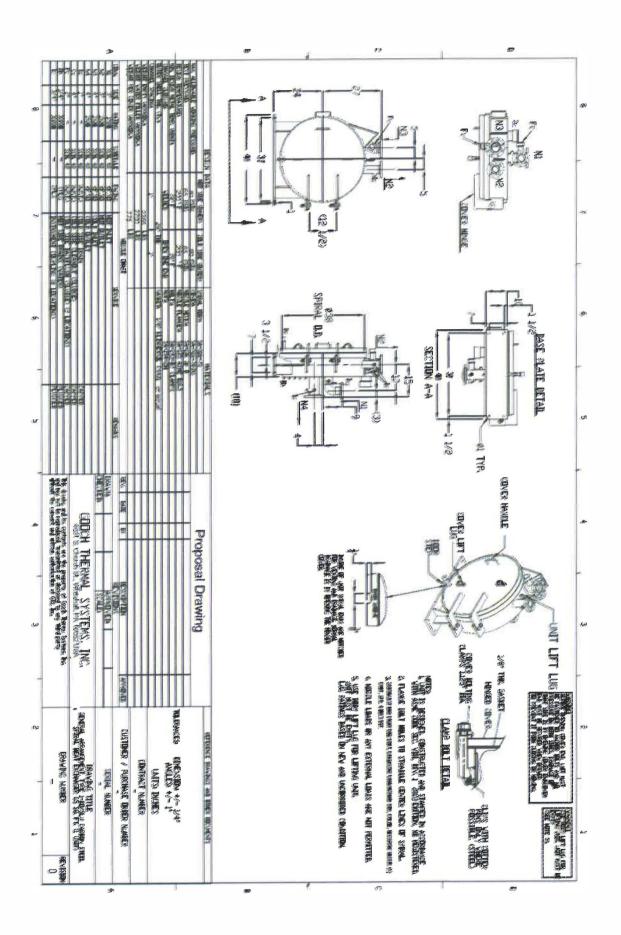

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Commissioners approve the General Manager to award a contract to Desert Flooring for \$36,320.72, plus a 10% contingency of \$3,632.00, to cover unforeseen expenses, totaling \$39,952.72, pending legal review and approval of the agreement.

PREVIOUS ACTION(S)

On June 18, 2020, the Board of Commissioners approved year 2020-2021 fiscal budget. The funds for this request reside in GL Code 01-02-535-6060-9999 operations budget.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On January 11, 2020 VVWRA contacted local flooring contractors and requested quotes to replace worn floors in the operations and maintenance building. Two (2) companies Desert Flooring, and Lyon's Floor Covering and Blinds, walked the job, recommended materials, and submitted quotes. Quality Floors for Less was not interested in taking on this job because of limited staff due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Quotes were reviewed to determine best value and quality. Staff identified that Desert Flooring is a local contractor with an excellent reputation and the ability to perform the work outlined in the quote. Because the minimum of three (3) quotes were not obtained. The VVWRA procurement policy section VII part H. Exclusions grants the board authority to award this job.

At this time staff is seeking approval from the Board to approve \$39,952.72 to Desert Flooring for replacement of the O&M building flooring.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Commissioners authorize the General Manager to execute a Grant of Easement document provided by Spectrum Pacific West LLC, pending Legal review and approval of the agreement.

PREVIOUS ACTION(S)

September 19, 2019 the VVWRA Board of Commissioners authorized the Interim General Manager to sign a Grant of Easement document provided by the High Desert Solar, LLC

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In September of 2019 the VVWRA Board approved a Grant of Easement for the High Desert Solar Project. That easement allows the High Desert Solar Project the ability to construct and maintain high voltage electric lines through VVWRA property for the purpose of connecting the new solar project to the electric grid. This project is now under construction. As part of the project the operator of the High Desert Solar project requires an internet connection to their facility. In order to provide that connection, the High Desert Solar team has asked that VVWRA work with Spectrum Pacific West LLC to allow an easement for the installation of poles on the southern VVWRA property line to allow for a new Spectrum service to be ran to the new High Desert Solar Power poles. Details on the location of the poles and the requirements to operate the new service are in the Grant of Easement Agreement attached as Exhibit 1.

Staff recommends that the Board of Commissioners authorize the General Manager to execute a Grant of Easement document provided by Spectrum Pacific West LLC. The location of this easement does not interfere with any VVWRA operations.

GRANT OF EASEMENT AGREEMENT

THE PARTIES HERETO AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- GRANT OF EASEMENT Grantor hereby grants to Operator, its successors and assigns, an 1. irrevocable, non-exclusive unrestricted-easement within the Easement Area to-the-Property-or-portion thereof (as defined in Section 2) for the installation, maintenance, operation, improvement, removal and repair of cable television system and other communications facilities, including, without limitation, lines, cables, amplifiers, nodes, utility cabinets, and other electronic equipment, towers and poles (the "Facilities"). Grantor hereby agrees that the Facilities shall remain the property of Operator, and are removable at Operator's option. The easement shall include the right of ingress and egress to the Property (as defined in Section 2) as necessary for the purpose of installation, maintenance, operation, improvement, removal and repair of the Facilities with the Easement Area during normal working hours or any other time, day or night, in the event of an emergency situation which, in Operator's reasonable determination, affects the normal operation of the cable system. Operator shall exercise its rights under the easement in such a manner as to not interfere with the operations of Grantor or any lessee of Grantor that is occupying the Property. Grantor warrants that he has title to the Property and that Operator shall have peaceable enjoyment of such easement. A portion of the Property is subject to a long term lease between Grantor and Arakelian Enterprises, Inc. Operator will not remove underground cables or underground lines during the term of the Easement Agreement or at the expiration of the Easement Agreement.
- **2. PROPERTY.** Grantor's property (the "Property") is situated in the City of Victorville, County of San Bernardino, State of California (the "Community"), with an Assessor's Parcel Number APN# 0468-111-13-0000 and Assessor's Parcel Number APN# 0468-111-15-0000. A legal description of the Property in which the easement has been granted is set forth on **Exhibit A**, which is attached hereto and by reference made a part hereof. The area of the Property that is subject to the easement as depicted on the drawings that are attached to Exhibit A consititue the "Easement Area".
- **3. REPAIR:** INDEMNITY. Operator shall repair or replace, as applicable, to the reasonable satisfaction of Grantor any structure, fence, paving, landscaping or other part of the Property which is

altered or damaged during the installation, maintenance, repair or removal of the Facilities in the easement. Operator acknowledges that there is currently a perimeter security fence withint the Easement Area that will remain in place. Operator will indemnify, defend and hold harmless Grantor, its elected officials, employees, lessee's, invitees, successors and assigns, from any claim involving property damage, personal injury or wrongful death as a result of the negligent acts or willful misconduct of Operator or its contractors within the Property.

- **4. ASSIGNMENT.** Operator may assign this Easement Agreement to any entity or individual that is a successor to Operator as a cable communications franchisee in the Community. No consent to such assignment is required from Grantor.

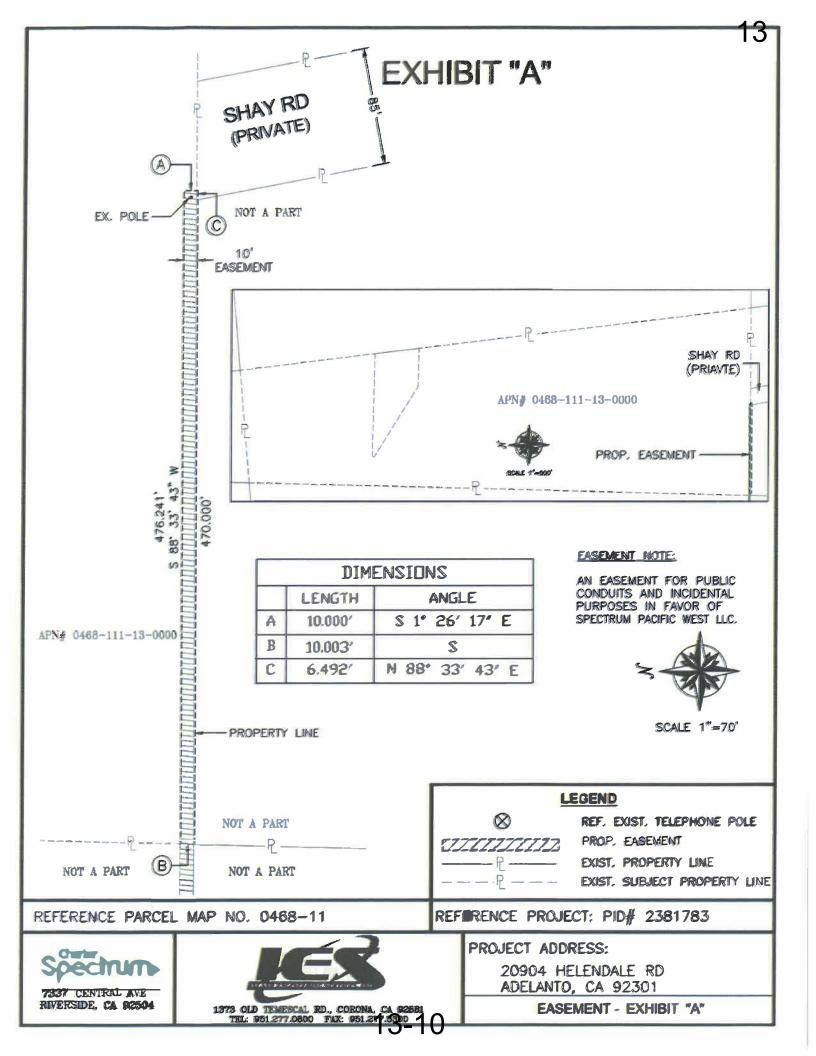

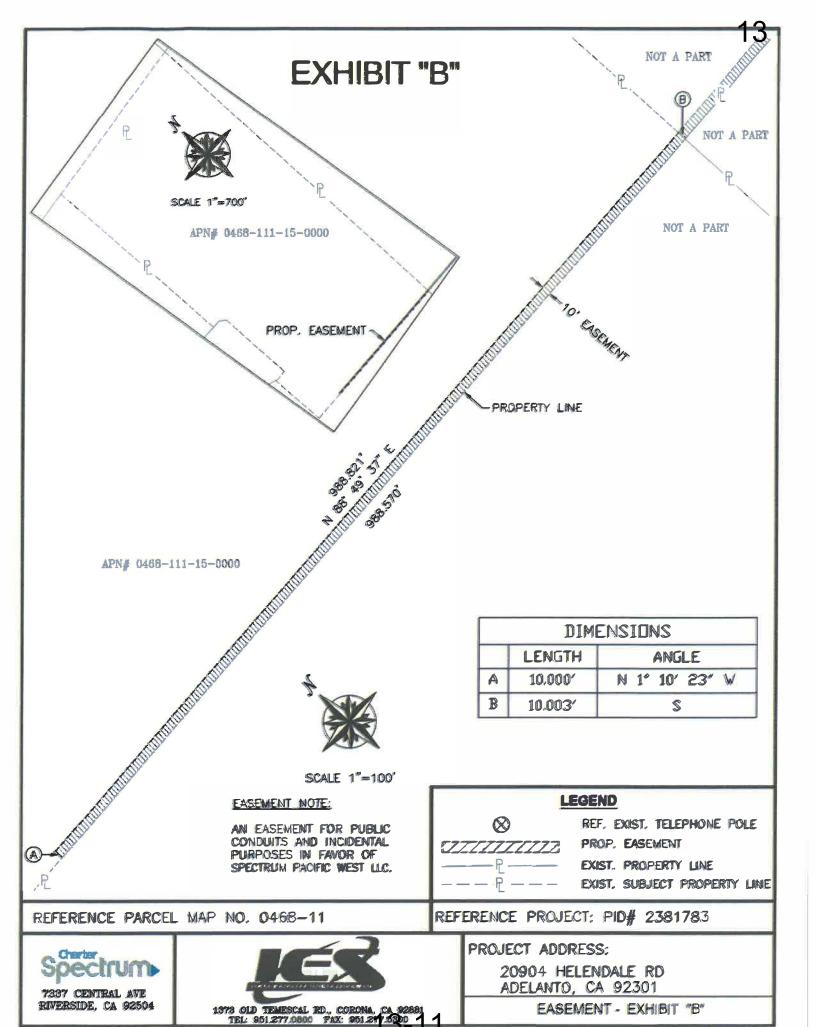

1. Cash balance at January 31, 2021 is \$18.05 million with reserves required for operations. The agreements with State Water Resources Control Board require we maintain the loan principal and interest payment amount for the following year.

- 2. The January 2021 financial statements show a deficit of \$260,799 (a cumulative year-to-date surplus of \$149,449) to reflect \$1.02 million (cumulative \$7.12 million) depreciation expense. The depreciation expense is a part of financial statements but does not affect our cash flow.
- 3. The current month user fee revenue is higher than a budgeted average monthly amount by \$73,487. The connection fee revenue received during the current month is also higher than a budgeted average monthly amount by \$9,514. However, the year-to-date connection fee revenue is only \$674,048 that is 28.8% of the budgeted \$2,339,500 for the year ending June 30, 2021. The expenses are what the staff processed during the month that may not match corresponding revenues. The staff will record matching expenses at a year-end by accruing incurred costs.

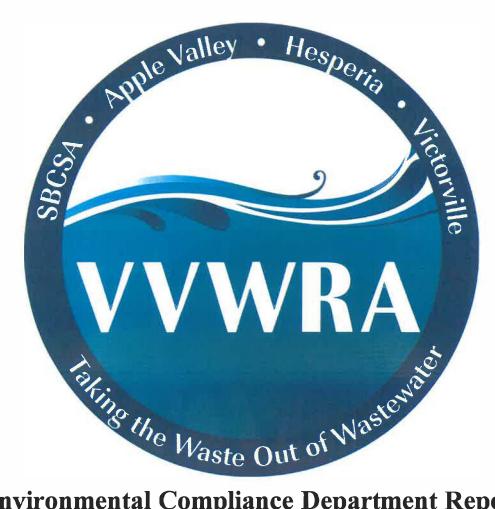

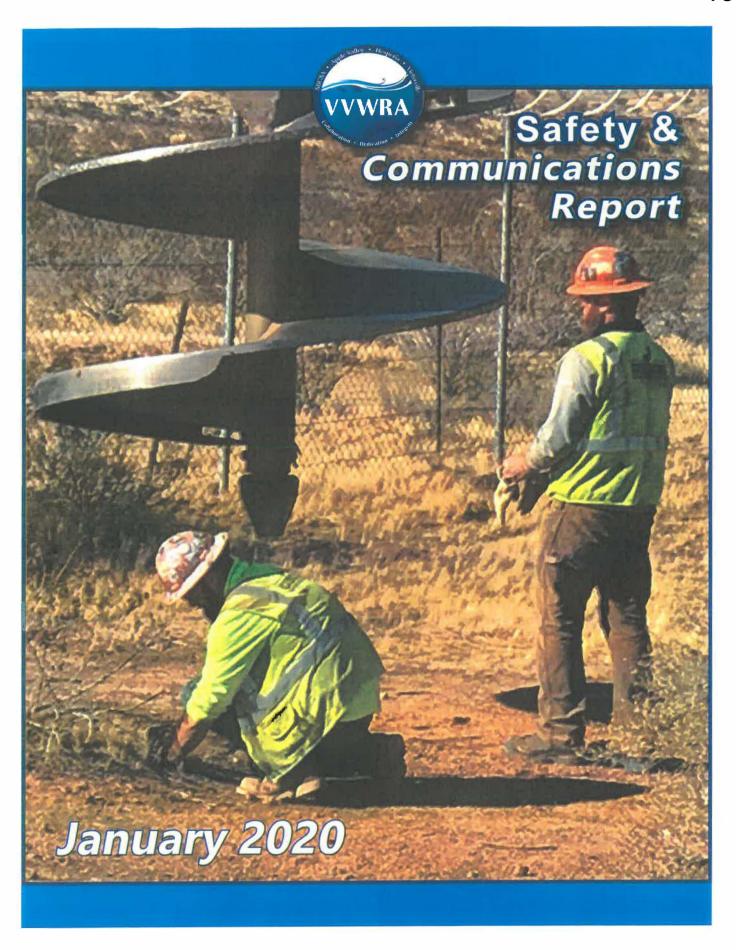

VVWRA receives final reimbursement for controversial Mojave River pipeline project

More than three years after federal auditors recommended taking back more than \$33 million for replacing a broken pipeline in the Mojave River and alleged mishandling of funds, the Victor Valley Wastewater Reclamation Authority received its final reimbursement for the project last month.

VVWRA General Manager Darron Poulsen said the \$5.8 million sent by the Federal Emergency Management Agency on Dec. 1 was an "exoneration of VVWRA and how it applied for and handled Federal funds."

"VVWRA always contended the grant money was procured and spent legally and in good faith and this payment affirms what we have said all along," he said in a statement.

The Upper Narrows project began after a sewer line ruptured in December 2010, spilling 42 million gallons of sewage into the river.

VVWRA — which provides wastewater services for Victorville, Apple Valley, Hesperia and other unincorporated San Bernardino County areas — replaced the pipeline in a roughly \$42-million construction project that was completed in 2016.

But auditors from the Department of Homeland Security's Office of the Inspector General said they found issues with how VVWRA awarded three contracts.

In January 2017, the OIG released a report which found the Authority did not comply with federal regulations and concluded that FEMA "had no assurance that these costs were reasonable or that the Authority selected the most qualified contractors."

The next year, OIG auditors released a second report that found VVWRA had provided misleading information to FEMA concerning the costs of alternative options and the final

price of the project.

According to the report, in applying for federal funds, the Authority presented FEMA with information that the option of relocating and replacing the pipeline outside of the Mojave Riverbed as the "least expensive option" despite two contractors telling wastewater officials it was the "most expensive option."

The OIG gave a list of recommendations to FEMA, including that the agency disallow the \$33.1 million in grant funds VVWRA was awarded.

Authority officials said last month that they "vehemently disputed the audits findings and produced thousands of records and interviews to support FEMA's funding of the project and show that no federal funds were ever improperly procured, misplaced or wasted."

A letter from the OIG sent in October shows that while FEMA agreed with some of the OIG's recommendations, it also found that VVWRA had "satisfactorily completed the approved (scope of work) to repair the damaged pipeline in accordance with FEMA mission objectives."

In addition, the letter stated that although FEMA agreed that VVWRA did not comply with "all Federal regulations regarding proper procurement standards under the grant," the agency was authorized to "grant reasonable costs" for the project.

FEMA ultimately approved about \$35.9 million in federal funds in February 2020, which included a \$2.8 million cost overrun.

"Integrity is one of our core values at VVWRA," Poulsen said. "I believe (the \$5.8 million final payment) will go a long way in assuring the public that we are good stewards of the resources we use."
